

2022 Distinguished Faculty Lecture

On August 31st, we started the semester off with an opening social where we loved getting to know so many of you. Our Phi Kap-



Ten Dissertation Fellowships of \$10,000 each are awarded annually to active members who are doctoral candidates and are completing dissertations. The
